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LAKES STILLHOUSE HOLLOW & GEORGETOWN DROUGHT STATUS RESCINDED

WACO, Texas (July 16, 2025) – The Brazos River Authority (BRA) has rescinded the Stage 1 Drought Watch for Lakes Stillhouse Hollow and Georgetown due to recent rainfall in the area. The Drought Watch was issued on April 3, 2025, as a result of prolonged dry conditions and their impact on the Palmer Hydrologic Drought Index (PHDI). A product of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the PHDI is an indicator of the level of wet or dry conditions within a particular area. Due to the drier-than-normal conditions in the lower Brazos River Basin, the monthly PHDI had dropped below the -2.4 trigger for Lakes Georgetown and Stillhouse Hollow.

The PHDI trigger is one of the criteria set in the BRA Drought Contingency Plan (DCP), which is used to extend water supply and availability during drought conditions. With both reservoirs now full, we do not anticipate the return of drought conditions for an extended period of time. There are currently no drought declarations in effect within the BRA water supply system.

The state requires the BRA to maintain and implement its Drought Contingency Plan (DCP). This plan outlines steps to extend the supply and availability of water during times of drought. The Drought Contingency Plan includes four stages. Each stage is marked by trigger points measured by a lake level, water storage capacity, or the Palmer Hydrologic Drought Index. Though the Stage 1 Drought Watch designation has been removed, the Brazos River Authority encourages everyone to use water wisely and always employ water conservation measures.
